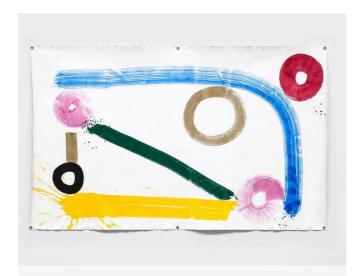
Art Fairs this September | Global South Highlights

This September the art fair season relaunches in various parts of the world, with the Armory Show in New York City, the inaugural edition of much anticipated Frieze Seoul and one of Africa's leading art fairs – FNB Art Joburg.





Highlights from the Global South at art fairs worldwide this September

This September the art fair season relaunches in various parts of the world, with The Armory Show in New York City; the inaugural edition of the much anticipated Frieze Seoul; and one of Africa's leading art fairs – FNB Art Joburg. Frieze Seoul and FNB Art Joburg represent major art market moments for Asia and Africa respectively. Frieze is joining longstanding art fair KIAF in galvanising the South Korean art scene, and bringing many international galleries to the

country for the first time. FNB Art Joburg maintains its Africa focus and extends its highly successful Open City model from last year, which activates the city of Johannesburg with cultural happenings in varied contexts. The Armory Show, which has remained an art market force in the United States since it was established in 1994, is offering a LatinX focus this year with curators Carla Acevedo-Yates, Mari Carmen Ramírez, and Tobias Ostrander heading the fair's curated sections.

kurimanzutto | Frieze Seoul | Main, Booth B16

At Frieze Seoul <u>kurimanzutto</u> presents a concentrated group of works by eleven artists from Latin America, Europe, and Asia. Works by Haegue Yang, Nairy Bagrahmian, Leonor Antunes, Danh Vo and Gabriel Orozco represent distinctive positions within the field of sculpture. Alongside these are paintings by Orozco, Oscar Murillo, and Roberto Gil de Montes, a tapestry by Gabriel Kuri, and a selection of pottery and collage on canvas from Rikrit Tiravanija's most recent exhibition at the gallery in Mexico City.

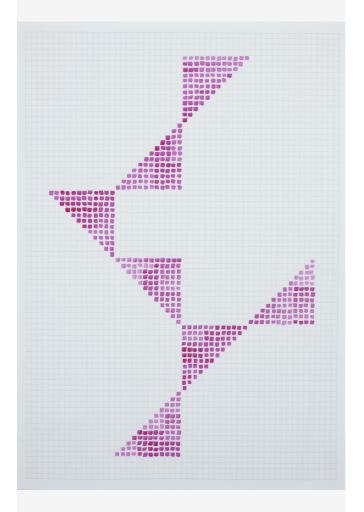

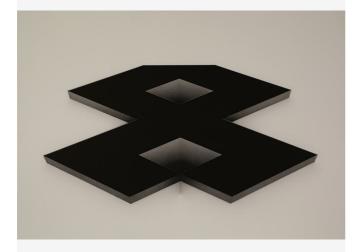

Jhaveri Contemporary | Frieze Seoul | Focus Asia, Booth F4

Mumbai's Jhaveri Contemporary is presenting a solo booth dedicated to Rana Begum as part of Frieze Seoul's Focus Asia section. Known for her bright geometric abstraction that embraces diverse media and ranges from the monumental to the intimate, Begum is engaged in a continual experimentation with colour, light, and space. Taking cues from Minimalism and Islamic design and absorbing the languages of architecture in the urban environment, Begum's works are acutely aware of their viewer and seek their interaction.

Dastan Gallery | Frieze Seoul | Focus Asia, Booth F8

Also forming part of Frieze Seoul's Focus Asia section, Iran's <u>Dastan Gallery</u> presents works of Ali Beheshti. In Beheshti's work the allegorical world becomes manifest. He pares down the visual characteristics of an object to such an extent that it appears the artist is merely reproducing and recreating a set of motifs. His forms have become more abstract over time, more geometric. All agency is given to the material and the artist's hands don't leave a trace behind, it is as if a machine has printed them on paper.

SOUTH SOUTH FILM | FNB Art Joburg | Institutional lounge D01

In our second art fair collaboration, **SOUTH SOUTH** presents a video programme titled *Human Tides*, to take place both online and at FNB Art Joburg. The programme features the work of 17 artists primarily from Africa, Latin America, Asia, the Middle East and the Diaspora, and explores the scope of human and cultural influence over the course of various ecosystems, considering absence and amassing, myth-making and mythology. This programme, following on from our collaboration with SP-ARTE in São Paulo earlier this year, will form part of FNB Art Joburg's ORG section, which looks to redefine how people engage with organisations that were established for the good of the public. From 1-4 September 2022, it will also be available online on our platform for those who will not be in Johannesburg for the fair, as well as those who would like to explore it in depth. Sicardi | Ayers | Bacino | The Armory Show

At the upcoming Armory Show, Sicardi | Ayers | Bacino (Houston, TX) will be presenting a group of work by Latin American artists in their programme, including Miguel Angel Ríos (Argentina) and Gabriel de la Mora (Mexico). Founded in 1994, the gallery was among the very first in the United States to represent avant-garde and contemporary artists from Latin America.

Jhaveri Contemporary | The Armory Show

For The Armory Show, <u>Jhaveri Contemporary</u> will present *Integrations*, a new body of work by Shezad Dawood looking at modernist buildings across the Global South, and what these reveal about the larger geopolitical backdrop that informed them. It specifically considers the utopian train of South-South collaboration embodied by the non-aligned movement and the Bandung (Asian-African) conference of 1955, the Cold War and petrodollar boom of the 1970s.
